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FROM NANCY L. DONAHUE, BOARD CHAIR.



When people ask me about Merrimack Repertory Theatre's founding, I often say: "We didn't know what we were doing, we just did it." We know a little more about what we're doing now, but that same sense of "can do" spirit exists today.

Over the last 40 years, MRT has become a nationallyknown theatre because of

wonderful people like you. It took millions of audience members, volunteers, donors, artists, and staff members to create and sustain a professional regional theatre in Lowell. My favorite part has always been the people—from bank leaders who invested in MRT from day one, to University of Lowell (now UMass Lowell), which gave us our first home, to the volunteers who seat you each night.

The establishment of MRT served as a catalyst for cultural organizations downtown. Having a professional theatre helped spur more non-profits to grow in Lowell, such as the New England Quilt Museum, the reinvigorated Whistler House Museum of Art, The Brush Art Gallery and Studios, Western Avenue Studios, and many more arts venues and theatre groups.

Lowell is unique – a blue-collar gateway city, a refuge for immigrants, and a home to theatre artists, who create new plays that will have long lives across the country. It's unusual for a city the size of Lowell to have a theatre like MRT, and it's terribly important. We're small, but we're tough.

My wish for Merrimack Repertory Theatre is a long life. I've stuck with MRT from the beginning because I loved bringing the best artists to Lowell. This city deserves the best.

Thank you for joining us for our 40th Anniversary Season of new plays. We're closing out the season on June 22, 2019, with a glamorous gala at the Lowell Memorial Auditorium, our sister theatre space at 50 East Merrimack Street. We hope you can join us for this very special celebration.

AMERICAN THEATRE INTERVIEWS PLAYWRIGHT MOLLY SMITH METZLER



When I first heard the title *Cry it Out,* perhaps because I'm not a mom yet, I wasn't thinking of it in the way the phrase is used in the play. Can you talk about how you chose your title?

MOLLY SMITH METZLER: I was almost done with the play, and I still didn't have a title. I was super-stressed out about it, because I had only bad ideas, like Two Coffees in a Yard, or Over Coffee. Just horrible. Then I remembered that the two main characters briefly talk about the "cry it out" sleep method — a disputed, controversial method of "teaching" your baby to sleep through the night by leaving them to scream their lungs out. It's aggressive, and it's not unlike what new parents go through: It's terrifying and you can cry out for help all you want, but no one is coming to your side with answers. You have to figure it out on your own. So I liked this idea for a title

The word "cry" is in the title. Do you feel like people carry a bias against that word itself, coming from a woman writer?

The main change has been the addition I think the title leads people to expect something soft, with lots of tears and breast milk. Which is not completely inaccurate-there's plenty of breast milk. But what's surprising is who is doing the most crying: the male character. He's the one "crying out" most loudly. It's an important texture of the story. To me this play is about the challenges facing new parents. It's about how unfair the socioeconomics of child care are in this country. It troubles me when the play is marketed as a "chick play." That's only 50 percent of who should be in the house. And it's contrary to the play's point: that parenthood isn't a women's issue.

When I look at your character descriptions, you explain the layered history of what these characters represent socioeconomically. Why is class so important in this story?

New parenthood is the perfect lens through which to examine socioeconomics. People talk about going back to work after you have a child like it's always a choice. Or they make it a feminist issue, making new mothers feel like they're stuck in the 1950s if they want to stay home, or they're cold-hearted careerists if they don't want to stay home. We make it black and white, and we're so judgmental. But it's a very complicated, personal, emotional, and financial thing.

Is there some place where motherhood and parenting defies socioeconomics?

The equalizer is friendship. That's what was wonderful about my maternity leave in Port Washington. I can't think of another time in life when you get to make new friends as an adult. You're home with a baby, you need to socialize the baby, and you need company to survive. So for the first time in decades, you're out at the library or coffee shops trying to make a new friend. I remember baking elaborate banana breads and trying to lure potential friends back to my crappy duplex. Finally I met the world's nicest new mom, and she saved my life by introducing me to the new parents in the community. We were from all walks of life, from Sands Points to food stamps. We had nothing in common except one huge thing: We all had little newborns.
